Mary Free Bed was again rated one of the nation's top specialty hospitals by *U.S. News & World Report*. Newsweek also recognized Mary Free Bed as one of the top rehabilitation hospitals in the country. Of the nation's 1,100 rehabilitation hospitals, Mary Free Bed continues to climb both lists.









Nationwide, few, if any, nonprofit rehabilitation hospitals served as many patients this past year. Mary Free Bed's team of 2,739 employees, staff and volunteers provided hope, and a lot of freedom, to more than 99,000 patients across our expanding system of care in fiscal year 2024. These patients and their loved ones put their trust in us, as do you, and we cherish the opportunity to serve all that we can.

Innovation has become a part of the Mary Free Bed culture, ensuring our patients receive the highest quality treatment and outcomes despite an ever-changing, challenging health care environment.

Collaboration through partnership with other nonprofit health care systems remains our strategy. To date, Mary Free Bed is partnering with 12 health care systems and 39 network hospitals to bring hope and freedom to an ever-expanding network of patients.

Mary Free Bed Grand Rapids opened 20 additional inpatient beds on our sixth floor. There have been times this year that these, and the rest of our beds, were completely filled.

Together with our partner, Corewell Health Helen DeVos Children's Hospital, we are in the process of raising 70 million dollars for the capital costs for Joan Secchia Children's Rehabilitation Hospital. Slated for completion in 2026, this state-of-the-art facility — one of only nine in the country — will provide a nurturing, empowering environment for children.

This annual report is a welcome reminder of how our shared efforts add up to a remarkable journey for a 133-year-old institution. This year is no different. These stories and milestones are evidence of our collective, continuous efforts to strive for excellence in all aspects of patient care. 

U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT

U.S. News & World Report ranks Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital as the 9th Best Rehabilitation Hospital in the nation. The 2024-25 rankings considered 1,049 hospitals, and results were based on a number of factors including clinical outcomes, physician perception, quality of care, and patient experience. Mary Free Bed exceeded the national average in several key metrics, including prevention of readmissions to general acute-care hospitals during and following rehabilitation stays, and the rate of patients being able to return home.



NEWSWEEK

For the fourth year in a row, *Newsweek* named Mary Free Bed as one of the Best Physical Rehabilitation Centers in the nation. Mary Free Bed ranked first among Michigan rehabilitation facilities. *Newsweek* reviewed 1,100 organizations across the country. Ratings are based on quality of care, service and follow-up treatment in addition to accommodations and amenities.

Mary Free Bed Sub-Acute Rehabilitation was also recognized, for the seventh straight year, by *U.S. News & World Report* for Best Short-Term Rehabilitation. The program received an overall rating at the highest level — five out of five.

Mary Free Bed exceeded state and national averages for a patient's ability to return home after their rehabilitation. Fewer patients developed infections resulting in hospitalizations compared to state and national averages.





WARRIOR MAC: Thriving against the odds with CP

When McKay "Mac" Mortier, entered the world in December 2015, his parents, Jessica and Justin, braced for a future filled with uncertainties. Born unresponsive, Mac was quickly transferred to Corewell Health Helen DeVos Children's Hospital, where his parents were told he might not live past the age of two.

Diagnosed with cerebral palsy, Mac required extensive rehabilitation. Starting therapy at Mary Free Bed at Munson Healthcare, he achieved small but significant milestones.

Pediatric physical and occupational therapies played crucial roles in his development, aiding not only his physical progress but also his cognitive and emotional growth. The innovative treatment methods and unwavering support of his therapists profoundly impacted Mac and his family.

Now in third grade, 8-year-old Mac thrives as a top reader, enjoying art, gym, and his role as the "mayor of his school."

As Mac's parents ponder his future whether it be college, driving, or other adventures to come — they do so with a sense of optimism and gratitude. Grateful for the years of therapy that have helped Mac thrive beyond imagination, they look forward to the endless possibilities that lie ahead.

Our specialists share expertise and education resources with the Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation System, an alliance of more than three dozen hospitals across Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Virginia.

Mary Free Bed manages inpatient rehabilitation units at several system hospitals. In certain cases, these relationships have developed into joint operating agreements. In some locations, inpatient JOAs* have been expanded to include general outpatient therapy services in addition to specialized offerings, such as pain rehabilitation and orthotics, prosthetics and bionics.



SERVING MORE PATIENTS

This expansion reflects Mary Free Bed's commitment to meeting the community's needs and providing exceptional rehabilitation services for a wide range of conditions, from stroke recovery to spinal cord injuries.

In October, we proudly unveiled the name of the new children's rehabilitation hospital project in Grand Rapids: Joan Secchia Children's Rehabilitation Hospital. Planned to open in 2026, the facility is a joint vision between Mary Free Bed and Corewell Health Helen DeVos Children's Hospital. Featuring advanced technology, innovative therapy programs, and a family-centered care approach, the hospital will be dedicated to providing comprehensive rehabilitation services for children with complex medical needs.







RISING UP WITH MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS: SAM'S JOURNEY

Samantha Pastucha's journey began in April 2023 with a seemingly simple ear problem. What followed was a rapid descent into confusion and physical decline. As she struggled at work, forgetting basic tasks and feeling shooting pains, it became clear something was seriously wrong. Despite initially being told it was anxiety, further hospital visits revealed a devastating diagnosis: multiple sclerosis (MS).

Transferred to Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital Adult Inpatient Rehabilitation program, Samantha faced a harsh reality — she would need to relearn to walk. The road was tough but Samantha's spirit remained unbroken. With the support of her dedicated therapists and sheer determination, she defied all expectations.

Sam graduated to outpatient therapy at Mary Free Bed — Muskegon. She promised to return to thank her inpatient therapy team — only next time, she would be walking on her own.

Now, walking again, she shares her journey to inspire others and raise awareness about MS. Her message is clear: with strength and support, it's possible to overcome even the most daunting challenges.





FUNCTIONAL IMPROVEMENT

USING THE QRP SCALE

The amount of functional improvement patients make in rehabilitation is measured by the difference in abilities between admission and graduation. A variety of skills used in daily living are tracked. We share this information with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid through the Quality Reporting Program (QRP), which enables us to compare the functional improvement of our rehabilitation patients to others across the nation.

Inpatients at the Grand Rapids Campus achieved more functional improvement than the national average as measured through QRP. The following information includes both adult and pediatric data.

GRAND RAPIDS EMT GETS HIS GROOVE BACK AFTER A STROKE

Lavell McDaniel, known for his infectious laugh and dance moves, earned the nickname "el Boogie" from his friends. In December 2022, the 36-year-old EMT suffered a stroke after delivering a patient to Helen DeVos Children's Hospital. He was rushed to Corewell Health Butterworth Hospital. It wasn't until eight days later that his wife, Destiny, heard his voice again.

Lavell spent over two months in the Mary Free Bed Adult Inpatient Stroke Rehabilitation program regaining strength and mobility. Music therapy played a crucial role, helping him physically and emotionally.

Destiny found support through caregiver education, learning self-care to better support Lavell. We celebrated his progress with a graduation tunnel and an awards ceremony for his five years of service with Life EMS.

Now continuing rehabilitation at home, Lavell works daily to add more "boogie" to his step and speech. His message: "This is my life, and it's a special one ... I have to keep fighting."

And that's music to our ears.
